
10 Ways to Support a Student's Career Preparation



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- Share your career journey and provide insight about the people and experiences that helped you explore pathways and make decisions.
- Highlight skills in the classroom by identifying the transferable and subjectrelated skills that students will learn in your class. The National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE) recommends <u>eight career readiness</u> <u>competencies</u> that will prepare students for lifelong career success.
- Invite former students to present about their internships or research experiences.
- 4 Offer to review students resumes or application essays and provide feedback.
- Give extra credit in class for students who attend a career fair or graduate school fair.
- Help arrange networking opportunities between students and alumnae by hosting a virtual or in-person Q&A panel.
- Advocate for your students and offer to serve as a reference. Check out this one-page guide for **Avoiding gender bias in reference writing** from The University of Arizona.
- Offer to introduce a current student with an upperclass student or recent graduate with similar interests.
- Encourage students' to participate in career development programs such as **FRESH** for first-year students and **SWEPT** for sophomores, juniors, and seniors.
