
At a Glance

Employers building strong teams know it's essential to recruit candidates from a variety of backgrounds.

Recruiting a diverse slate of candidates often begins at the entry-level, making the role of university recruiters especially important in finding promising candidates and bringing them into an organization. And while there are many ways to build a successful university recruiting strategy, seeking out candidates from a wide range of colleges and universities is an important one.

One important piece of that puzzle is investing in Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), a group of more than 100 universities with historical significance and hundreds of thousands of bright, talented students. To help more talent teams establish or expand their presence at HBCUs, we've put together a guide with key facts to know about these institutions, tips for recruiting there, what students at HBCUs value in the workplace, and the top schools for subjects like STEM, business, and liberal arts.

5 Facts to Know About HBCUs

When making plans to recruit at HBCUs, it's important to understand their historical context, as well as why these schools provide such a unique learning environment. We asked a former HBCU student to share some key facts for talent teams to know.

O1 HBCUs have existed for almost 200 years.

At a time when African-Americans were unable to pursue an education at white institutions, HBCUs were created to equip African-Americans with basic education. As a recruiter, it is important to know that you are about to encounter a group that takes pride in its history, reputation, and legacy.

02 HBCU students often have more meaningful experiences.

An ongoing study reveals that Black students at HBCUs have more meaningful experiences compared to those at Predominantly White Institutions. This may be due to the environment of HBCUs, where family and collaboration are highly valued. The similarity of experiences among Black HBCU students creates a diverse community of support that allows them to not only succeed, but to have a memorable time doing it as well.

03 HBCU students feel supported at their institutions.

When surveyed, Black HBCU students and graduates were more than twice as likely to recall a time where they felt supported by a professor or faculty member. Because many HBCUs serve first-generation, low-income students, it is important that students are welcomed by a nurturing environment that helps them tackle many hurdles. This support is displayed in numerous ways; as some professors offer mentorship, guidance, and networking to their students, and can help them find internships and entry-level roles.

04 HBCUs are responsible for a quarter of African-American STEM graduates.

According to the United Negro College Fund, HBCUs are responsible for 25% for all African-American science, technology, engineering, and mathematics degrees. The top universities that helped produce these graduates include Florida A&M University, Howard University, Morgan State University, and North Carolina A&T State University.

05 There are over 100 HBCUs across 20 states.

While many companies heavily recruit at popular HBCUs such as Howard University, Spelman College, and Morehouse College, there are more HBCUs that companies should be open to recruiting from. If you're anywhere among the eastern states, there's an HBCU within reach for recruitment! HBCUs are spread across 20 states, the District of Columbia, and U.S. Virgin Islands.

5 Tips for Recruiting at HBCUs

If you're reading this guide, you likely already have a presence at HBCUs or are hoping to establish one. To help strengthen your employer brand on campus and reach the right candidates, here are our top tips:

O1 Don't limit yourself to the most well-known HBCUs.

Not only are there more than 100 HBCUs in the U.S., but there are a number of which that produce particularly strong graduates in industries that traditionally lack diversity. For example, North Carolina A&T State University in Greensboro and Florida A&M University in Tallahassee are known to generate significant numbers of graduates in STEM. If employers are willing to go the extra mile and look in addition to heavily-recruited schools, they could benefit from seeing a more diverse group of graduates who are eager to apply to their companies.

02 Develop a strong relationship with campus career centers.

In addition to broadening the scope at which recruitment actually happens, companies that are looking to create a more diverse workforce should be open to communicating regularly with career centers at HBCUs. Getting in contact with the right point person can make it easier to introduce the company's goals and initiatives, as well as set up a regular cadence of events.

03 Engage students through special events.

While making the effort to get on campus and communicate directly with prospective employees at HBCUs is perhaps the most traditional way for companies to introduce themselves to a more diverse talent pool, make the effort to set up events in which students from specialized programs at HBCUs get the opportunity to gain a more organic understanding of what it's like to actually work at a company. From panels with employees to professional development workshops to virtual office tours, there are countless ways to get creative.

04 Create programs for underrepresented identities.

One strategy that companies can look into is creating educational partnerships with various HBCUs to offer experiences students can value as they move forward post-grad. For example: Howard West, a program developed in partnership between Google and Howard University, allows Howard and other HBCU students to receive hands-on computer science training at the Googleplex for a full academic year.

O5 Share with candidates how you'll invest in their growth.

RippleMatch data on our candidates at HBCUs reveals that these students rank professional development as a top priority when searching for a job. In your recruitment marketing materials and throughout the interview process, be sure to share information about career mapping, mentorship, employee resource groups, and any other forms of professional development investment.

What HBCU Students Value at Work

Understanding what students value in a career can help you highlight the things that matter most. See below for data on HBCU students that we collected between February 2022 and 2023.

Career Development

On average, students at HBCUs rank professional development as their top priority when searching for a job. On a scale of 1 (not at all important) to 5 (extremely important), HBCU students rank professional development as a 4.48 – the average across all students on our platform is a 4.38. HBCU students also rank upward mobility as important, giving it a composite score of 4.18 (compared to our platform average of 4.03). Finally, job stability is especially important to students at HBCUs. Tied for the second most important value, it's important to show how your company makes long-term investments in its employees.

Company Culture

Students at HBCUs rank a 'sense of community' and 'work-life balance' as more important than the average of all students. Recruiters should showcase how their inclusive culture promotes happiness inside and outside of the workplace – sharing information about employee resource groups or flexible work policies can help your company stand out.

Social Impact

On average, RippleMatch users rate a company's social impact initiatives as 3.6/5 in terms of importance. Students at HBCUs rate a company's social initiatives as a 3.9/5. While things like career development and company culture are rated as slightly more important, companies with a socially-conscious mission can benefit from highlighting their impact. Companies that aren't geared toward social good can still share their corporate social responsibility programs such as paid volunteering time or company-wide charitable initiatives.

Huntsville, AL | Enrollment: 5,107

AAMU provides an excellent STEM Knowledge Center where students can access tutoring, software, education advising, and career support.

Alabama State University

Montgomery, AL | Enrollment: 3,499

ASU not only has great programs for STEM students but also specific initiatives to help students from underrepresented backgrounds succeed.

Florida A&M University

Tallahassee, FL | Enrollment: 7,301

Florida A&M University is currently ranked as the #I HBCU for Research and Development by the National Science Foundation.

Hampton University

Hampton, VA | Enrollment: 2,863

Hampton University recently received a grant to provide need scholarships for students majoring in STEM, and created an incoming freshman program around mathematics preparedness.

Howard University

Washington, D.C. | Enrollment: 8,964 Howard proves their STEM program's strength by being ranked as the top producer of African American undergraduates who later earn science and engineering doctoral degrees.

Jackson State University

Jackson, MS | Enrollment: 4,763

JSU features a special summer program called "Bridge to the Future" for incoming freshmen in the College of Science, Engineering and Technology.

Morgan State University

Baltimore, MD | Enrollment: 7,034

MSU attracts underrepresented youth to STEM fields through multiple programs, such as through the school's partnership with NASA.

North Carolina A&T State University

Greensboro, NC | Enrollment: 11,596

NCAT partners with the Association for Women in Science to promote equality and work toward increasing the amount of women in STEM.

Prairie View A&M University

Prairie View, TX | Enrollment: 8,372

Prairie View has a 'Traveling STEM Mobile Road Show' to excite high school students about STEM and the idea of pursuing a STEM degree, to help close the representation gap in science/math fields.

Spelman College

Atlanta, GA | Enrollment: 2,417

Because Spelman is a women's college they're not only helping increase the amount of Black students entering STEM fields, but also working to increase the low amount of women in STEM.

Howard partners with Google on a semester-long program where CS students can gain real world experience, training, and networking opportunities.

Morgan State University

Baltimore, MD | Enrollment: 7,034

MSU's CS program provides students with a comprehensive skillset they can immediately use in their profession, and trains them to adapt to industry changes.

Norfolk State University

Norfolk, VA | Enrollment: 5,016

NSU's CS program focuses on the practical and theoretical sides of CS and prepares students for a future as computer software engineers, system analysts, and more.

North Carolina A&T State University

Greensboro, NC | Enrollment: 11,596

North Carolina A&T is the largest public HBCU in the nation, and they've been named the top public school for combining research and teaching by the Wall Street Journal.

Xavier University of Louisiana

New Orleans, LA | Enrollment: 2,755

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
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
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
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
