Costs of Applying to Medical School

Cost:

AMCAS fee: \$160² Additional School: \$38 School Application Fees: ~\$75 - \$150 per school (Payable at the secondary stage)

Applying to medical school can be costly.

It's important very applicant should have a "core group" of wisely-chosen schools.

A mixture of schools that are *in-state* and out-of-state for which you are competitive and also have a strong & lesser shot of acceptance.



School Website, Social Media, and Publications

- **1. School Websites**: Often, more detailed information than the MSAR e.g. prerequisite policies, MCAT requirements, Recommender Guides, etc.
 - <u>Tufts 2021 Class Profile</u>: Undergrad Institutions Represented · Geographic Representation · Racial/Ethnic Diversity · Entering Class Grades & Scores · More!
 - Georgetown <u>2021 Guide to Application</u>: substantive, longitudinal clinical experiences such as: shadowing physicians, medical mission trips, scribing, EMS, etc.
- 2. Social Media: are you following your top # schools?
 - YouTube Channel "What Drexel Looks For in a Medical Student"



3. View online or request information: Brochures, fact sheets, viewbooks, etc.



Rankings

 Medical schools are highly regulated by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME), and ultimately all medical schools will prepare you for residency and the USMLE.



- Is Brand names may open doors, but you will also pay for the brand.
- Rankings can be a good way to get a sense of a school, but be wary!
- Consider the rankings of schools within a specialty of interest.

Oregon Health & Science University (Portland, OR)

- #1 in Family Medicine Programs
 - #28 in Best Medical Schools: Research
 - #7 in Best Medical Schools: Primary Care (tie)

Rankings

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Your future opportunities will be more tightly coupled with your performance during medical school and your United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) scores than the name of the institution on your degree.¹

Location

Public vs. Private

Cost

• Public schools are heavily subsidized by the state, and generally offer less expensive tuition to all students, with greatest discounts given to state residents.

Applicant Preference

 Public schools do prefer applicants from the states in which they're located. Yet, there are a number of public schools that are "friendly" to out-of-state applicants. Read the <u>Prospectivedoctor.com</u> article for more information.

- Faculty Accessibility


- · Presence of an appropriate Ph.D. program

Grades

Grading policies can be important for applicants to take into consideration as they evaluate different opportunities.

A school's grading policy can highlight their culture and community, potentially informing an applicant of it's competiveness and one's own stress levels.

Clinical Experience & Associated Hospitals



Not all your learning will happen in class. It's important to know the hospitals and medical centers, and where and when you'll gain clinical experience.

Curriculum & Joint Degree

Most medical schools offer 2 years of basic science courses followed by 2 years of clinical instruction, while many schools have diversified their curriculum allowing students to begin clinical clerkships in the 1st (Univ. of Vermont) or 2nd year (Duke University).

If you're considering a joint/dual degree, it's important to know:

- 1) if the school offers your program of interest MD/PhD, MD/JD, MD/MBA, MD/MPH.
- 2) the process for applying to this program.
- 3) at what point during medical school will you start and complete this added degree.
