^{*} English, math, and foreign language placement tests must be completed at least 7 days prior to attending orientation in order to complete your fall registration. This holds even if you are expecting transfer or AP credit and even if you are not planning to take math or foreign language in the fall. <u>Learn</u> more about placement tests.

Note on Science classes for future semesters

BMS 200 (Biology of Aging) is required in your major. Most Gerontology students will begin taking science in the spring of their first year. When planning your science classes, plan to take **one** of the following groups as a pre-requisite for BMS 200:

- BIO101/101L & BIO 102/102L (General Biology 1 & 2) OR
- BIO 150/150L & BIO 151/151L (General Biology for Majors 1 & 2) OR
- BMS 117/117L (The Human Organism) & BMS 162 (Human Health & Disease)
