Example Interview Questions for Educators

<u>General</u>

- Tell us about yourself.
- What is your educational and professional preparation?
- What strengths do you have that would enhance our school/district/teaching staff?
- What would your worst critic say about you?
- What is a unique quality specific to you?
- What are your interests outside of teaching?

Relationships with Students

- Describe a successful experience working with a diverse student population.
- What kind of students do you like to work with?
- What sort of students could you teach most effectively?
- How do you help students experience success?
- How do you work with struggling learners?
- How would you challenge a slow learner and an advanced learner in the same classroom?
- How do you approach student motivation?
- What do you think is the best approach to empower students, apposed to enabling them?
- How will you establish and foster relationships with students, particularly those with challenging behaviors?

<u>Relationships with Colleagues</u>

- Can you describe an example of a project where you worked collaboratively? What were the goals, challenges, and outcomes?
- What experiences do you have working in PLCs (Professional Learning Communities) in your common content courses? What are the benefits of collaborating with colleagues in other content areas?
- What kind of assistance would you like from other staff members?
- Describe your feelings about working in a team environment in which some items, such as curriculum, are agreed u[pon as a team, department, school, etc.

Relationships with Parents

- What do you believe is the most effective way to communicate with parents? How have you used these techniques?
- What would you include in your Open House presentation to parents?
- Discuss when and why you would contact a parent.

Teaching Techniques and Pedagogy

- Briefly describe your philosophy of education.
- Describe how you would make your content culturally relevant for your students.
- List and describe three teaching strategies that you feel most competent using.
- How will you make your classroom a safe learning environment?
- How are you prepared to address the racial achievement gap?
- What are the most significant challenges in teaching and learning in current classrooms?
- How will you approach accessibility and accommodate students with special needs?
- What is the most unique lesson you have taught in a classroom?
- How would you integrate technology into the curriculum you would teach?
- Give an example of a lesson that went well and an example of a lesson that did not go as planned. What did you learn from these experiences?
- What is your philosophy of classroom management?
- What would we see if we observed your work in the classroom?
- What do you believe is the best strategy or method for coaching students?
- What methods do you use to evaluate student progress besides tests?
- Are you comfortable with using online grading software?
- What kind of student data do you use to inform your planning and instruction?

Content Knowledge

- Describe the three most important concepts in your subject matter that students need to understand to become successful.
- What are the current trends in curriculum in your teaching area?
- Why did you choose to study your subject area?
- What areas of your subject are you uncomfortable teaching?

Professionalism and Motivation

• Why did you choose to become a teacher?

- What does it mean to be an educator?
- Describe the characteristics of the best and worst teachers you have known.
- What is the correct professional dress and demeanor for a classroom teacher?
- What are your goals for the next five years?
- What has been your most positive teaching experience? Your most negative?
- Describe three people who have most influenced your own education and your career.

School/Community/Position

- What activities would you like to be involved with at our school?
- What community activities would you want to be associated with? Why?
- How do you expect working at this school will be different from your previous experience?
- What needs or expectations do you have for the school administration?
- How do you deal with fast-paced, high intensity, high expectation job settings? What experiences will help in preparing you for a demanding situation?
- Describe the ideal teaching situation for you. What type of students are you teaching, what course, what resources are available to you, what level of students, etc?
- What teaching situations do you do your best work in?
- Please identify one of our school's building principles of missing that catches your attention. How would you bring that idea to life?
- If you were hired for this position, what would you do first to prepare?
- If you accepted the position here, what changes would you make immediately and what would you want to change down the road?

Behavioral-based/situational questions

- You end your lesson and give students 15-20 minutes to do their homework. A student has put his head down on the desk. What would you do or say?
- You have a special needs student with ADHD in your classroom. She is repeatedly disruptive talking to those around her, getting up multiple times during the class period to sharpen her pencil, and making comments such as, "This is stupid. When will I ever use this in the real world?" What would you do?
- A paper was due at the end of a two-week unit. A student of yours didn't meet the deadline. He tells his parents that he did not have enough time to finish it. His mother is a school board member. What would you say or do?
- A parent comes to you and complains that what you are teaching their child is irrelevant to the child's needs. How would you respond?

• How would you initiate a discussion with a student who has not completed their work for several days in a row?

Additional Questions

- What attributes do you possess that enable you to be a positive role model for students?
- "The fundamental purpose of school is learning, not teaching." Do you agree or disagree with this statement? Why?
- What current trends in public education are positive to you? Negative?

Questions to Ask at the Interview

- What would staff, students, and parents say are the strengths of the school?
- How does the school support professional development?
- How are parents involved with the school?
- What is the school policy or philosophy on inclusion?
- What technology resources are available for myself to use and for the (grad level/subject area)?
- Are there duties outside of the classroom that are expected of teachers?
- How receptive are you of changes in the curriculum? What is the process?
