I was able to work next to leading professionals on a variety of engaging and challenging projects, both of which I would not have been able to do without this opportunity.

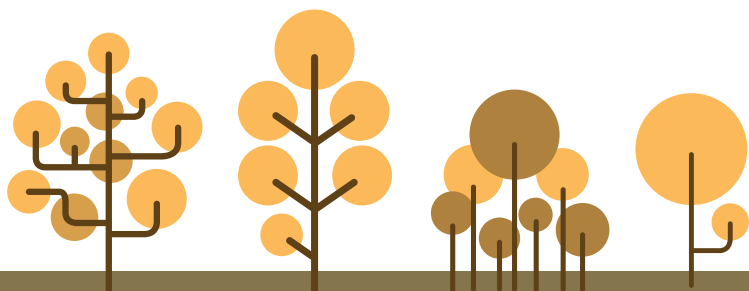
## Managers say...

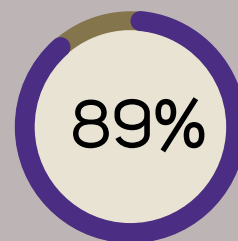
**30** Interns in **28** Departments
