2 ANNUAL EMPLOYMENT REPORT

Since 1995, the Career Center has published an annual employment report of graduates with baccalaureate degrees. Graduates are surveyed before and three and six months after graduation by electronic surveys, mailed surveys and telephone calls.

This report provides a snapshot of students in every undergraduate major who graduated in August 2010, December 2010 and May 2011.





ANNUAL EMPLOYMENT REPORT HIGHLIGHTS


Data for this report was collected through mail surveys, follow-up telephone calls and academic departments/faculty. The Career Center surveyed graduates of baccalaureate degrees from NDSU for terms ending in August 2010, December 2010 and May 2011. This report is based on responses from 1,523 graduates (84% of the reported 1,814 undergraduate degrees).

Of the 1,523 respondents:

- 844 (55%) reported "Employed."
- 311 (20%) reported "Post Baccalaureate & Professional" education.
- 312 (20%) reported still "Active in Job Search."
- 56 (4%) reported "Not Seeking Employment" or refused to participate in survey.

Of the 844 employed respondents:

- 740 (88%) reported: "Employed related to their studies."
- The average annual "related" reported salary of respondents was \$40,000. The highest reported salary was \$81,000.
- Graduates reported accepting employment in 35 states, Washington, D.C., and five foreign countries.
- 491 respondents (58%) reported accepting employment in North Dakota.
- 192 respondents (23%) reported accepting employment in Minnesota.
- 435 respondents reported their "original home state" as North Dakota, of which 321 reported accepting employment in North Dakota (74% retention).
- Of this year's employed graduates from the College of Agriculture, Food Systems, and Natural Resources, 13% have chosen to farm or ranch.

Post Baccalaureate & Professional

Graduates who are pursuing post baccalaureate or professional education or additional undergraduate majors.

Entering Job Market

Graduates who have entered or are ready to enter the job market.

"Employed Unrelated to Major/Minor"
"Active in Job Search"

Does not include:

"Post Baccalaureate & Professional"
"Unable to Survey"

Employed Related to Major/Minor

Full-time and part-time employment information collected from graduating student survey. *Note: Part-time employment is included only if graduate is not seeking full-time employment.

Employed Unrelated to Major/Minor

Full-time and part-time employment information collected from graduating student survey.

Active in Job Search

Information collected from graduating student survey indicating graduates were actively seeking employment.

Percent Employed

Number of graduates employed ("Employed Related to Major/Minor" and "Employed Unrelated to Major/Minor") divided by "Entering Job Market."

Salary Range (Average - High)

Only base salaries of full-time positions reported as "Employed Related to Major/ Minor" were used. Commissions, bonuses, incentives and fringe benefits were not included. For privacy reasons, some salary amounts are not shown in majors with minimal data returns.
